1. Defendants are, and, at all times mentioned herein, were, a business or corporation or franchise organized and existing and/or doing business under the laws of the State of California.
2. Plaintiffs are further informed and believe and thereon allege that Defendants PERSON PRESCRIPTION PHARMACY; LEVINSON, DAVID C (CO TR) ET AL; LEVINSON FAMILY TRUST AND MOSHEIN, JACK CO TR MOSHEIN TRUST are

1 the owners, operators, and/or lessors of the real property, as well as the business operated

11 3. The words "Plaintiffs" and "Plaintiff's Member" as used herein specifically
12 include the organization and TRIPPLE AAA ASSOCIATION FOR CHILDREN AND
13 ADULTS WITH DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES, SUING ON BEHALF OF ITS
14 MEMBERS, JIM COHAN; and persons associated with its Members who accompanied
15 Members to Defendants' facilities.

16 4. Defendants Does 1 through 10, were at all times relevant herein subsidiaries,
17 employers, employees, agents, of Defendants PERSON PRESCRIPTION PHARMACY;
18 LEVINSON, DAVID C (CO TR) ET AL; LEVINSON FAMILY TRUST AND
19 MOSHEIN, JACK CO TR MOSHEIN TRUST. Plaintiffs are ignorant of the true names
20 and capacities of Defendants sued herein as Does 1 through 10, inclusive, and therefore
21 sue these Defendants by such fictitious names. Plaintiffs will pray leave of the court to
22 amend this complaint to allege the true names and capacities of the Does when
23 ascertained.

24 5. Plaintiffs are informed and believe, and thereon allege, that Defendants and each
25 of them herein were, at all times relevant to the action, the owner, lessor, lessee,
26 franchiser, franchisee, general partner, limited partner, agent, employee, representing
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1 partner, or joint venturer of the remaining Defendants and were acting within the course
2 and scope of that relationship. Plaintiffs are further informed and believe, and thereon
3 allege, that each of the Defendants herein gave consent to, ratified, and/or authorized the
4 acts alleged herein to each of the remaining Defendants.

5 **CONCISE SET OF FACTS**

6 6. Plaintiff's Members JIM COHAN visited the Defendants' facility. Plaintiff has an
7 impairment.

8 7. Defendants failed to provide auxiliary aids and services that are necessary to
9 ensure equal access to the goods, services, privileges, or accommodations that it offers.

10 Title 28, part 36.303 of Code of Federal Regulations states:

11 (a) General. A public accommodation shall take those steps that may be
12 necessary to ensure that no individual with a disability is excluded, denied
13 services, segregated or otherwise treated differently than other individuals
14 because of the absence of auxiliary aids and services, unless the public
15 accommodation can demonstrate that taking those steps would
16 fundamentally alter the nature of the goods, services, facilities, privileges,
17 advantages, or accommodations being offered or would result in an undue
18 burden, i.e., significant difficulty or expense.

19 (b) Examples. The term "auxiliary aids and services" includes:

20 (1) Qualified interpreters, notetakers, computer-aided transcription
21 services, written materials, telephone handset amplifiers, assistive
22 listening devices, assistive listening systems, telephones compatible with
23 hearing aids, closed caption decoders, open and closed captioning,
24 telecommunications devices for deaf persons (TDD's), videotext displays,
25 or other effective methods of making aurally delivered materials available
26 to individuals with hearing impairments;
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1 (2) Qualified readers, taped texts, audio recordings, Brailled materials,
2 large print materials, or other effective methods of making visually
3 delivered materials available to individuals with visual impairments;

4 (3) Acquisition or modification of equipment or devices; and

5 (4) Other similar services and actions.

6 (c) Effective communication. A public accommodation shall furnish
7 appropriate auxiliary aids and services where necessary to ensure effective
8 communication with individuals with disabilities.

9 Defendants failed to comply with Title 28, part 36.303 of Code of Federal Regulations as
10 it failed to provide Qualified readers, taped texts, audio recordings, Brailled materials, or
11 large print materials. Further, Defendants failed to remove architectural barriers as
12 attached as Exhibit A.

13 8. Plaintiff's Member and Plaintiff(s) have physical impairments because their
14 conditions affect one or more of the following body systems: neurological,
15 musculoskeletal, special sense organs, and/or cardiovascular. Further, Plaintiff's
16 Member and Plaintiff(s) said physical impairments substantially limits one or more of the
17 following major life activities: seeing and mobility. In addition, Plaintiff's Member and
18 Plaintiff(s) cannot perform one or more of the said major life activities in the manner,
19 speed, and duration when compared to the average person. Moreover, Plaintiff's
20 Member and Plaintiff(s) has a history of or has been classified as having a physical
21 impairment as required by 42 U.S.C. § 12102(2)(A).

22 9. Plaintiff's Members expressly intend to patronize the establishment and the
23 property that is the subject of this Complaint in the immediate future.

24 10. Plaintiff's Member was deterred from patronizing the facility.

25 **WHAT CLAIMS ARE PLAINTIFFS ALLEGING AGAINST EACH NAMED**
26 **DEFENDANT**
27

1 11. Defendants PERSON PRESCRIPTION PHARMACY; LEVINSON, DAVID C
2 (CO TR) ET AL; LEVINSON FAMILY TRUST AND MOSHEIN, JACK CO TR
3 MOSHEIN TRUST and Does 1 through 10 will be referred to collectively hereinafter as
4 “Defendants.”

5 12. Plaintiffs aver that the Defendants are liable for the following claims as alleged
6 below:

7 **DISCRIMINATORY PRACTICES IN PUBLIC ACCOMMODATIONS**

8 **FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION AGAINST ALL DEFENDANTS- Claims Under The**
9 **Americans With Disabilities Act Of 1990**

10 Claim I

11 13. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiffs on the
12 basis of disability in the full and equal enjoyment of the goods, services, facilities,
13 privileges, advantages, or accommodations of any place of public accommodation as
14 Defendants own, lease (or lease to), or operate a place of public accommodation in
15 violation of 42 U.S.C. §12182.

16 Claim II

17 14. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiffs
18 directly, or through contractual, licensing, or other arrangements, to a denial of the
19 opportunity of the individual or class to participate in or benefit from the goods, services,
20 facilities, privileges, advantages, or accommodations of an entity in violation of 42
21 U.S.C. §12182.

22 Claim III

23 15. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiffs as it
24 is discriminatory to afford an individual or class of individuals, on the basis of a disability
25 or disabilities of such individual or class, directly, or through contractual, licensing, or
26 other arrangements with the opportunity to participate in or benefit from a good, service,
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1 facility, privilege, advantage, or accommodation that is not equal to that afforded to other
2 individuals in violation of 42 U.S.C. §12182.

3 Claim IV

4 16. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiffs as it
5 is discriminatory to provide an individual or class of individuals, on the basis of a
6 disability or disabilities of such individual or class, directly, or through contractual,
7 licensing, or other arrangements with a good, service, facility, privilege, advantage, or
8 accommodation that is different or separate from that provided to other individuals.

9 Claim V

10 17. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiffs as
11 Defendants failed to afford to an individual with a disability in the most integrated
12 setting appropriate to the needs of the individual in violation of 42 U.S.C. §12182.

13 Claim VI

14 18. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiffs as
15 Defendants utilized standards or criteria or methods of administration that have the effect
16 of discriminating on the basis of disability; or that perpetuate the discrimination of others
17 who are subject to common administrative control in violation of 42 U.S.C. §12182.

18 Claim VII

19 19. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiffs as it
20 is discriminatory to exclude or otherwise deny equal goods, services, facilities, privileges,
21 advantages, accommodations, or other opportunities to an individual or entity because of
22 the known disability of an individual with whom the individual or entity is known to have
23 a relationship or association in violation of 42 U.S.C. §12182. See *Niece v. Fitzner* 922 F.
24 Supp. 1208 (1996)

25 Claim VIII

26 20. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiffs as
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1 Defendants engaged in the specific prohibitions as stated in 42 U.S.C. §12182.

2 Claim IX

3 21. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiffs as
4 Defendant failed to demonstrate that the removal of a barrier is not readily achievable,
5 and made such goods, services, facilities, privileges, advantages, or accommodations
6 available through alternative methods in a segregated manner in violation of 42 U.S.C.
7 §12182.

8 Claim X

9 22. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiffs as
10 Defendants altered the use of their establishment in a manner that affected or could have
11 affected the usability of the facility or part thereof and failed to make alterations in such a
12 manner that, to the maximum extent feasible, the altered portions of the facility are
13 readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities, including individuals
14 who use wheelchairs in violation of 42 U.S.C. §12183.

15 23. WHEREFORE, Plaintiffs pray for judgment and relief as hereinafter set forth.

17 **SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION AGAINST ALL DEFENDANTS - CLAIMS UNDER**
18 **CALIFORNIA ACCESSIBILITY LAWS**

19 **CLAIM I: Denial Of Full And Equal Access**

20 24. Based on the facts plead above and elsewhere in this complaint, Plaintiff's
21 Member and Plaintiff(s) was denied full and equal access to Defendants' goods, services,
22 facilities, privileges, advantages, or accommodations within a public accommodation
23 owned, leased, and/or operated by Defendants as required by Civil Code Sections 54 and
24 54.1.

25 **CLAIM II: Failure To Modify Practices, Policies And Procedures**

26 25. Based on the facts plead at ¶¶ 6-16 above and elsewhere herein this complaint,
27 Defendants failed and refused to provide a reasonable alternative by modifying its
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1 practices, policies, and procedures in that they failed to have a scheme, plan, or design to
2 assist Plaintiffs and/or others similarly situated in entering and utilizing Defendants'
3 services as required by Civil Code § 54.1. Thus, Plaintiff's Member and Plaintiff(s) were
4 subjected to discrimination in violation of Civil Code § 54.1.

5 **CLAIM III: Violation Of The Unruh Act**

6 26. Based on the facts plead above and elsewhere herein this complaint and because
7 Defendants violated the Civil Code § 51 by failing to comply with 42 United States Code
8 § 12182(b)(2)(A)(iv) and 42 U.S.C. § 12183(a)(2), Defendants did and continue to
9 knowingly discriminate against Plaintiffs and persons similarly situated in violation of
10 Civil Code §§ 51, 52, and 54.1. Plaintiffs allege the access violations alleged here are so
11 obvious as to implicate at least a prima facie case of discriminatory intent.

12 27. Based on the facts plead above, Claims I, II, and III of Plaintiffs' Second Cause
13 Of Action above, and the facts elsewhere herein this complaint, Plaintiffs will suffer
14 irreparable harm unless Defendants are ordered to remove architectural, non-
15 architectural, and communication barriers at Defendants' public accommodation.
16 Plaintiffs allege that Defendants' discriminatory conduct is capable of repetition, and this
17 discriminatory repetition adversely impacts Plaintiffs and a substantial segment of the
18 disability community. Plaintiffs allege there is a state and national public interest in
19 requiring accessibility in places of public accommodation. Plaintiffs have no adequate
20 remedy at law to redress the discriminatory conduct of Defendants. Plaintiffs desire to
21 return to Defendants' places of business in the immediate future. Accordingly, the
22 Plaintiffs allege that a structural or mandatory injunction is necessary to enjoin
23 compliance with state civil rights laws enacted for the benefit of individuals with
24 disabilities.

25 28. Wherefore, Plaintiffs pray for damages and relief as hereinafter stated.

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

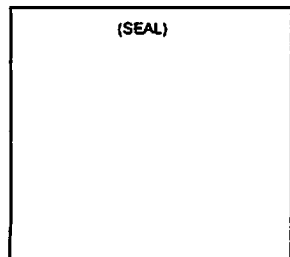
