Plaintiff is informed, believes and thereon alleges that Defendants are, and, at all times mentioned herein, were, a business or corporation or franchise organized and existing and/or doing business under the laws of the State of California. Plaintiff is informed and believes and thereon alleges that Defendant HANDLER PHARMACY is the owner, operator, and/or lessor/lessee of the real property and the public accommodation located thereon at the Property Address: 4729 S WESTERN AVE, LOS ANGELES, CA 90062. Defendant HANDLER PHARMACY is located at 4729 S WESTERN AVE, LOS ANGELES, CA 90062.
2. The words Plaintiff and Plaintiffs as used herein specifically include JON CARPENTER.
3. Defendants Does 1 through 10, were at all times relevant herein subsidiaries, employers, employees, agents, of Defendant HANDLER PHARMACY. Plaintiff is ignorant of the true

1 names and capacities of Defendants sued herein as Does 1 through 10, inclusive, and therefore
2 sues these Defendants by such fictitious names. Plaintiff will pray leave of the court to amend
3 this complaint to allege the true names and capacities of the Does when ascertained.

4 4. Plaintiff is informed and believes, and thereon alleges, that Defendants and each of them
5 herein were, at all times relevant to the action, the owner, lessor, lessee, franchiser, franchisee,
6 general partner, limited partner, agent, employee, representing partner, or joint venturer of the
7 remaining Defendants and were acting within the course and scope of that relationship. Plaintiff
8 is further informed and believe, and thereon allege, that each of the Defendants herein gave
9 consent to, ratified, and/or authorized the acts alleged herein to each of the remaining Defendants.

10 **CONCISE SET OF FACTS**

11 5. Plaintiff JON CARPENTER (hereinafter "Plaintiff") has physical impairments and due to
12 these impairments he has learned to successfully operate a wheelchair for mobility. Plaintiff said
13 physical impairments substantially limit one or more of the following major life activities
14 including but not limited to: walking.

15 6. Plaintiff has physical impairments because their conditions affect one or more of the
16 following body systems: neurological, musculoskeletal, special sense organs, and/or
17 cardiovascular. Further, Plaintiff said physical impairments substantially limits one or more of
18 the following major life activities. In addition, Plaintiff cannot perform one or more of the said
19 major life activities in the manner, speed, and duration when compared to the average person.
20 Moreover, Plaintiff has a history of or has been classified as having a physical impairment as
21 required by 42 U.S.C. § 12102(2)(A).

22 7. On January 10, 2008, Plaintiff JON CARPENTER wanted to visit Defendants' public
23 accommodation facilities located at Property Address: 4729 S WESTERN AVE, LOS
24 ANGELES, CA 90062 to utilize their goods and/or services. When Plaintiff JON CARPENTER
25 patronized Defendants' public accommodation facilities, he was unable to use and/or had
26 difficulty using the public accommodations' facilities including but not limited to the barriers to
27 access listed herein and said facilities were not accessible because they failed to comply with
28

1 ADA Access Guidelines For Buildings and Facilities (hereafter referred to as "ADAAG" and
2 codified in 28 C.F.R. Part 36, App. A) and/or California's Title 24 Building Code Requirements.
3 Defendants failed to remove barriers to equal access within their public accommodation facilities
4 as required.

5 8. Plaintiff JON CARPENTER was deterred from visiting the property due to said access
6 barriers as listed herein to the present Complaint at Defendants' public accommodation facilities
7 located on the Property and/or has knowledge of said access barriers and is presently deterred
8 from accessing the public accommodation. Plaintiff alleges that these known barriers to access
9 are not an exhaustive list of the barriers to access that exist at Defendants' facilities.

10 9. Defendants failed to provide auxiliary aids and services that are necessary to ensure equal
11 access to the goods, services, privileges, or accommodations that it offers. Title 28, part 36.303
12 of Code of Federal Regulations states:

13 (a) General. A public accommodation shall take those steps that may be necessary to ensure that
14 no individual with a disability is excluded, denied services, segregated or otherwise treated
15 differently than other individuals because of the absence of auxiliary aids and services, unless the
16 public accommodation can demonstrate that taking those steps would fundamentally alter the
17 nature of the goods, services, facilities, privileges, advantages, or accommodations being offered
18 or would result in an undue burden, i.e., significant difficulty or expense.

19 (b) Examples. The term "auxiliary aids and services" includes:

20 (1) Qualified interpreters, notetakers, computer-aided transcription services, written
21 materials, telephone handset amplifiers, assistive listening devices, assistive listening
22 systems, telephones compatible with hearing aids, closed caption decoders, open and
23 closed captioning, telecommunications devices for deaf persons (TDD's), videotext
24 displays, or other effective methods of making aurally delivered materials available to
25 individuals with hearing impairments;

26 (2) Qualified readers, taped texts, audio recordings, Brailled materials, large print
27 materials, or other effective methods of making visually delivered materials available to
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1 individuals with visual impairments;

2 (3) Acquisition or modification of equipment or devices; and

3 (4) Other similar services and actions.

4 (c) Effective communication. A public accommodation shall furnish appropriate auxiliary aids
5 and services where necessary to ensure effective communication with individuals with
6 disabilities.

7 10. Plaintiff can prove these barriers as Plaintiff conducted a preliminary survey of
8 Defendants' facility. Plaintiff specifically alleges that Defendants knew, to a substantial
9 certainty, that the architectural barriers precluded equal access. First, Plaintiff will prove that
10 Defendants had actual knowledge that the architectural barriers precluded equal access and that
11 the noncompliance with ADAAG as to accessible entrances was intentional. Second, due to the
12 abundance of ADA information and constant news covers of ADA lawsuits, Defendants had
13 actual knowledge of the ADA and decided deliberately not to remove architectural barriers.
14 Third, Defendants have no plans to remodel. Fourth, Defendants had actual knowledge of ADA
15 given all the ADA public awareness campaigns, the abundance of free ADA information and the
16 media's constant ADA coverage. Fifth, a human being acting for the defendants made a
17 conscious decision as to how to proceed given the presence of the architectural barriers. Plaintiff
18 alleges any alternative methods preclude integration of disabled patrons, as it requires them to use
19 second-class facilities. Also, expert testimony will show the facility contained inaccessible
20 features. Plaintiff alleges businesses often state that they have few customers with disabilities.
21 Plaintiff alleges such customers avoid patronizing inaccessible businesses and are deterred from
22 patronizing such businesses.

23 11. For example, there is no accessible parking and signs. These violations deterred the
24 Plaintiff's access to the pharmacy.

25 12. Plaintiff intends to return to Defendants' public accommodation facilities in the immediate
26 future. Plaintiff was deterred and is presently deterred from returning due to his knowledge of the
27 barriers to access that exist at Defendants' facilities.
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1 13. Pursuant to federal and state law, Defendants are required to remove barriers to their
2 existing facilities. Further, Defendants had actual knowledge of their barrier removal duties
3 under the Americans with Disabilities Act and the Civil Code before January 26, 1992. Also,
4 Defendants should have known that individuals with disabilities are not required to give notice to
5 a governmental agency before filing suit alleging Defendants failed to remove architectural
6 barriers.

7 14. Plaintiff believes and herein alleges Defendants' facilities have access violations not
8 directly experienced by Plaintiff which would preclude or limit access by Plaintiff potentially
9 including but not limited to violations of the ADA, ADA Accessibility Guidelines (Codified in 28
10 C.F.R. Part 36, App. A) and Title 24 of the California Building Code. Plaintiff alleges
11 Defendants are required to utilize the ADA checklist for Readily Achievable Barrier Removal
12 approved by the United States Department of Justice and created by Adaptive Environments.
13 Plaintiff is entitled to injunctive relief to remove all barriers to access that are related to his
14 disability even those barriers that are only known to exist but are not directly experienced by
15 plaintiff. *Doran v 7-Eleven Inc*, 2007 U.S.App.Lexis 26143 (9th Cir 2007).

16 15. Based on these facts, Plaintiff alleges he was discriminated against each time he
17 patronized and/or was deterred from patronizing Defendants' facilities. Plaintiff was extremely
18 upset due to Defendants' conduct.

19 16. Plaintiff is not required to provide notice to the defendants prior to filing a complaint
20 and/or to recover attorney fees and costs. *Botosan v. Paul McNally Realty*, 216 F.3d 827, 832
21 (9th Cir 2000). *Skaff v Meridien*, 2007 U.S. App. LEXIS 25516 (9th Cir 2007).

22 **WHAT CLAIMS ARE PLAINTIFF ALLEGING AGAINST EACH NAMED**

23 **DEFENDANT**

24 17. Defendants HANDLER PHARMACY and Does 1 through 10 will be referred to
25 collectively hereinafter as "Defendants."

26 18. Plaintiff avers that the Defendants are liable for the following claims as alleged below:

27 **DISCRIMINATORY PRACTICES IN PUBLIC ACCOMMODATIONS**

1 FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION AGAINST ALL DEFENDANTS- Claims Under The Americans
2 With Disabilities Act Of 1990

3 Claim I

4 19. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiff on the basis of
5 disability in the full and equal enjoyment of the goods, services, facilities, privileges, advantages,
6 or accommodations of any place of public accommodation as Defendants own, lease (or lease
7 to); or operate a place of public accommodation in violation of 42 U.S.C. §12182.

8 Claim II

9 20. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiff directly, or
10 through contractual, licensing, or other arrangements, to a denial of the opportunity of the
11 individual or class to participate in or benefit from the goods, services, facilities, privileges,
12 advantages, or accommodations of an entity in violation of 42 U.S.C. §12182.

13 Claim III

14 21. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiff as it is
15 discriminatory to afford an individual or class of individuals, on the basis of a disability or
16 disabilities of such individual or class, directly, or through contractual, licensing, or other
17 arrangements with the opportunity to participate in or benefit from a good, service, facility,
18 privilege, advantage, or accommodation that is not equal to that afforded to other individuals in
19 violation of 42 U.S.C. §12182.

20 Claim IV

21 22. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiff as it is
22 discriminatory to provide an individual or class of individuals, on the basis of a disability or
23 disabilities of such individual or class, directly, or through contractual, licensing, or other
24 arrangements with a good, service, facility, privilege, advantage, or accommodation that is
25 different or separate from that provided to other individuals.

26 Claim V

27 23. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiff as Defendants
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1 failed to afforded to an individual with a disability in the most integrated setting appropriate to
2 the needs of the individual in violation of 42 U.S.C. §12182.

3 Claim VI

4 24. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiff as Defendants
5 utilized standards or criteria or methods of administration that have the effect of discriminating on
6 the basis of disability; or that perpetuate the discrimination of others who are subject to common
7 administrative control in violation of 42 U.S.C. §12182.

8 Claim VII

9 25. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiff as it is
10 discriminatory to exclude or otherwise deny equal goods, services, facilities, privileges,
11 advantages, accommodations, or other opportunities to an individual or entity because of the
12 known disability of an individual with whom the individual or entity is known to have a
13 relationship or association in violation of 42 U.S.C. §12182. See *Niece v. Fitzner* 922 F. Supp.
14 1208 (1996)

15 Claim VIII

16 26. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiff as Defendants
17 engaged in the specific prohibitions as stated in 42 U.S.C. §12182.

18 Claim IX

19 27. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiff as Defendant
20 failed to demonstrate that the removal of a barrier is not readily achievable, and made such goods,
21 services, facilities, privileges, advantages, or accommodations available through alternative
22 methods in a segregated manner in violation of 42 U.S.C. §12182. Plaintiff is entitled to
23 injunctive relief to remove all barriers to access that are related to his disability even those
24 barriers that are only known to exist but are not directly experienced by plaintiff. *Doran v 7-*
25 *Eleven Inc*, 2007 U.S.App.Lexis 26143 (9th Cir 2007).

26 Claim X

27 28. Based on the facts stated above, Defendants discriminated against Plaintiff as Defendants
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1 altered the use of their establishment in a manner that affected or could have affected the usability
2 of the facility or part thereof and failed to make alterations in such a manner that, to the maximum
3 extent feasible, the altered portions of the facility are readily accessible to and usable by
4 individuals with disabilities in violation of 42 U.S.C. §12183.

5 29. WHEREFORE, Plaintiff pray for judgment and relief as hereinafter set forth.
6

7 **SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION AGAINST ALL DEFENDANTS - CLAIMS UNDER**
8 **CALIFORNIA ACCESSIBILITY LAWS**

9 **CLAIM I: Denial Of Full And Equal Access**

10 30. Based on the facts plead above and elsewhere in this complaint, Plaintiff was denied full
11 and equal access to Defendants' goods, services, facilities, privileges, advantages, or
12 accommodations within a public accommodation owned, leased, and/or operated by Defendants
13 as required by Civil Code Sections 54 and 54.1.

14 **CLAIM II: Failure To Modify Practices, Policies And Procedures**

15 31. Based on the facts plead above and elsewhere herein this complaint, Defendants failed and
16 refused to provide a reasonable alternative by modifying its practices, policies, and procedures in
17 that they failed to have a scheme, plan, or design to assist Plaintiff and/or others similarly situated
18 in entering and utilizing Defendants' services as required by Civil Code § 54.1. Thus, Plaintiff
19 was subjected to discrimination in violation of Civil Code § 54.1.

20 **CLAIM III: Violation Of The Unruh Act**

21 32. Based on the facts plead above and elsewhere herein this complaint and because
22 Defendants violated the Civil Code § 51 by failing to comply with 42 United States Code §
23 12182(b)(2)(A)(iv) and 42 U.S.C. § 12183(a)(2), Defendants did and continue to knowingly
24 discriminate against Plaintiff and persons similarly situated in violation of Civil Code §§ 51, 52,
25 and 54.1. Plaintiff alleges the access violations alleged here are so obvious as to implicate at least
26 a prima facie case of discriminatory intent.

27 33. Based on the facts plead above, Claims I, II, and III of Plaintiffs' Second Cause Of
28 Action above, and the facts elsewhere herein this complaint, Plaintiff will suffer irreparable harm

1 unless Defendants are ordered to remove architectural, non-architectural, and communication
2 barriers at Defendants' public accommodation. Plaintiff alleges that Defendants' discriminatory
3 conduct is capable of repetition, and this discriminatory repetition adversely impacts Plaintiff and
4 a substantial segment of the disability community. Plaintiff alleges there is a state and national
5 public interest in requiring accessibility in places of public accommodation. Plaintiff has no
6 adequate remedy at law to redress the discriminatory conduct of Defendants. Plaintiff desires to
7 return to Defendants' places of business in the immediate future. Accordingly, the Plaintiff
8 alleges that a structural or mandatory injunction is necessary to enjoin compliance with state civil
9 rights laws enacted for the benefit of individuals with disabilities.

10 34. Wherefore, Plaintiff prays for damages and relief as hereinafter stated.
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18 **DEMAND FOR JUDGMENT FOR RELIEF:**
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- 20 A. For injunctive relief pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 12188(a).
21 B. For general damages pursuant to Cal. Civil Code §§ 52 or 54.3;
22 C. For \$4,000 in damages pursuant to Cal. Civil Code § 52 for each and every offense of
23 Civil Code § 51, Title 24 of the California Building Code, ADA, and ADA Accessibility
24 Guidelines (Codified in 28 C.F.R. Part 36, App. A);
25 D. In the alternative to the damages pursuant to Cal. Civil Code § 52 in Paragraph C above,
26 for \$1,000 in damages pursuant to Cal. Civil Code § 54.3 for each and every offense of Civil
27 Code § 54.1, Title 24 of the California Building Code, ADA, and ADA Accessibility Guidelines;
28 E. For treble damages pursuant to Cal. Civil Code §§ 52(a) or 54.3(a);

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- F. For attorneys fees pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1988, 42 U.S.C. § 12205, and Cal. Civil Code § 52; 54.3;
- G. A Jury Trial and;
- H. For such other further relief as the court deems proper.
